"A MOST INTERESTING RELIGIOUS SERVICE..."

Attend an 1860's church service complete with bellowing preacher, acoustic instruments and hymn-books in the oldest Baptist church in the Waikato Region. From July 1868 several families began meeting as a Baptist fellowship in the cottage of Sophia and Henry Driver on Hape Street. They were seated on planks laid across old blasting powder barrels and lead by William 'Daddy' Mason, known for his flowing white beard and his bag full of bibles and writing gear with which he would traverse the mining claims in the hills, writing letters home for many of those who were unable to write. Several of the present day members are descended from the original congregation, including the preacher, a great grand-son of Henry and Sophia.
